#### FROM THE RABBI

DAYEINU "It would have been enough for us!" or "Enough already – choose somebody else!"

#### **MONDAY NIGHT APRIL 14 FIRST NIGHT SEDER**

Gathering with family and friends in our own houses, right after sundown, one of our rowdiest songs will be Dayeinu! The verses in the Haggadah (the prayer book for Passover) tell of one good thing after another: Getting out of Egyptian slavery, receiving the gift of Shabbat, receiving the Torah... After each one we sing Dayeinu, if that was the only good thing God ever did for us, it would have been enough. It's a lesson in counting our blessings. Some people like to add their personal Dayeinu moments: Having loving parents, getting an education, meeting my spouse...

#### TUESDAY MORNING APRIL 15 PASSOVER MORNING SERVICE (11:00) AND LUNCH & LEARN (12:00 p.m.)

Do something special this year and come to B'nai Sholom on Passover Morning for a Festival Service with joyful poetry and music from the Song of Songs: "Oh give me the kisses of your mouth for your love is more delightful than wine!"

At noon we will look at another side of Dayeinu, as heard in Fiddler on the Roof: "God, I know we are Your chosen people, but once in a while, couldn't You choose somebody else?" Arthur Szyk was a Polish Jewish artist who devoted the last years of his life in the U.S. to illustrations against the Nazis and in support of Jewish efforts to found a state of our own. He probably would NOT have phrased Dayeinu the way Sholom Aleichem did, but he attacked the Pharaohs of his time. He wove the trials of Jewish life during the war years into his depictions of biblical stories and into the Haggadah for Passover. It is part of the Jewish process of watching how the ancient stories unfold during our own life and times.

## COUNTING THE OMER – EVERY DAY FROM 2ND NIGHT SEDER TO SHAVUOT

At our Second Night Seder we begin the count. Fifty days from remembering slavery at Passover to receiving the Torah at Shavuot. This year we are combining our count with raising money for our local Facing Hunger Foodbank. Our goal is \$50 per household, \$1 a day per household, \$100 a day for the congregation, hoping to reach a grand total of \$5,000 by Shavuot.

The last morning of Passover by the Reform Jewish calendar we will have our memorial service in the chapel. It is an opportunity at the end of the Festival of Freedom to remember those we have lost. 

# EMPTY BOWLS PROJECT



The *Empty Bowls* offers guests who contribute \$15, a generous portion of soup donated by area restaurants, and served in a unique ceramic bowl, handmade by a student in Marshall's Keramos Student Pottery Guild.

The bowl is yours to take home as a lasting reminder of the hunger that so many in our region regularly face.

This year's event will be Friday, April 11, 2014 at the First Presbyterian Church, 10:30 AM to 2:00 PM.

#### There is also an opportunity to bid on dozens of items at a SILENT AUCTION.

Last year, the nearly 1,000 people in attendance at *Empty Bowls* had the opportunity to bid on dozens of items, including gift baskets from local businesses, sports memorabilia autographed by Marshall athletes and coaches, and a two night all inclusive trip to the General Lewis Inn located in Lewisburg, WV.

Last year's lunch and the auction raised nearly \$17,000, with all proceeds going to the Facing Hunger Food Bank (formerly Huntington Area Food Bank) – a nonprofit food distribution center that provides food to soup kitchens, emergency relief shelters and other hunger relief programs throughout the Tri-State.

Each dollar donated at Empty Bowls enables the Food Bank to distribute seven pounds of food to the hungry in our region. Every \$15 donation – the price of your special lunch – will feed an entire family for three weeks.

As partners in this important project, B'nai Sholom Congregation has assumed responsibility for obtaining items for the SILENT AUCTION. This will involve contacting local businesses and local attractions for donations.

#### Federated Jewish Charities Ukraine Assistance Fund

The Jewish Federations of North America are mobilizing a communal response to the situation in Ukraine and have announced the Ukraine Assistance Fund as an initial response to the situation in Ukraine. "As the situation escalates, needs in the Ukrainian Jewish community become even more acute," said Michael Siegal, Chair of the JFNA Board of Trustees. "It's critical that we maintain our commitment to provide assistance to the most vulnerable in our community and ensure our Jewish institutions are secure." The Ukrainian Jewish population, estimated at around 300,000, is one of the largest in the world. The area is already home to some of the world's poorest Jews, and the currency devaluation and increasing economic uncertainty are affecting the entire community.


- JDC has activated its emergency response network to ensure continued home deliveries of food, medicine, heating and cooking fuel, and sustained life-saving care at home for the elderly. It has increased security at select Jewish communal institutions and *Hesed* social welfare centers
- The Jewish Agency has tapped its Emergency Assistance Fund to bolster security at Ukraine's many Jewish institutions, including synagogues, yeshivas and community centers.
- World ORT has launched a campaign to raise \$200,000 to fund increased security at four of its schools in Ukraine. Each school has several hundred students, many of whom travel to class through now-dangerous areas. These efforts, and so many more, are being funded by Jewish Federation dollars. JFNA continues to assess the evolving situation on the ground and is committed to working with its partners at home and abroad throughout this crisis. One hundred percent of all donations for this fund will be used for aid and will be forwarded immediately to JFNA.

# For B'nai Sholom Congregation, 14 March 2014: My Reasons for Becoming a Jew By Charles Lloyd

Before I begin, I owe special thanks to two people whom I regard as my Jewish sponsors and models, Lynne and Paul Mayer. Without their support and encouragement, I wouldn't have made this journey.

The reasons I first came to the synagogue don't exist anymore. The only reasons that matter are the ones I discovered once I got here:



- 1) Jews possess a reasoned and reasonable understanding of religious faith that both allows enormous differences from one Jew to another and recognizes the frailty of human beings. Rabbi Menachem Froman lived most of his life in Israel where he strived to heal the hatred separating Israelis and Palestinians. In his obituary, the *New York Times* reported: "He said that he had spent his whole life trying to decide if God existed and had never found an answer. He said he could not escape dwelling on the fact that most of his family had been killed in Poland by the Nazis." How freeing that is for the rest of us! This is a Rabbi, a practicing Rabbi. So, it's all right if some days our faith flags. It's all right not to know but act the same as if we did.
- 2) As a musician and just as a human being, I'm captivated by and drawn to Jewish music. Its strains haunt me. Even the happiest songs sound sad. Their fast rhythms transform minor melodies into the best expressions of what it means to be human and holy. As a person of Welsh descent, I understand this beautiful paradox.
- 3) Every week, Jews celebrate again the creation of the world, and thus they stretch time back to its beginning. "Primitive" best describes the centrality of Shabbat in Jewish faith and life. By this word, I mean not derived from or reducible to something else, original, primary, or basic. Nothing stands in the way of the believer—no intermediary, just the miracle of observing again each week Shabbat, Adonai's rest from creation, what becomes for us a day of thanksgiving and celebration, our happiness, our contentment, when we receive our second soul, when we see in our minds what the world could be like, when we understand what we could make it into. I don't yet understood how I need to live this day, how to practice the discipline that allows me into the *oneg*, the delight, of Shabbat. But, by allowing me to enter here, you have opened up before me the potential of being able to create the appropriate, beautiful, and perfect response to Adonai's creation. Thus, not only does Shabbat place us at the creation, but it invites us to be creators ourselves of Shabbat's delight.
- 4) Being a Jew invites me to see the world as composed of miracles, and encourages me to live inside astonishment. In B'reishit, Jacob dreams of the ladder and Adonai who makes him wonderful promises, and then Jacob says (28:16), "Truly, Adonai is in this place and I did not know it!" We are so blinded by the everydayness of our lives that we fail to see Him all around us. The Caribbean poet Derek Walcott says it best in a 2003 poem: "The perpetual ideal is astonishment." Enveloped so tightly by the world about us, we must struggle to see the miracles that make it up. Several times in my life I've taken the time to sit on the wall in front of our house and watch the night come. As I watched one cloud change color, I found that I'd missed greater changes elsewhere. And by watching the sunset, I'd find that I'd almost missed the darkness growing stronger at trees' trunks and moving outward to take over. That's why I was so moved by "Ma'ariv 'Avarim," the blessing we say about Adonai's creation of evening, the prayer of thanksgiving for the miracle of night's coming, that I composed music to celebrate this miracle. To be a Jew means that you aim for this ideal of living inside astonishment.

5) If there were a single thing that draws me inescapably toward being a Jew, it is the song/poem "Eli, Eli" by Hannah Sanesh. She was shot to death by a German firing squad on 7 November 1944 after trying to rescue Hungarian Jews. Its simplicity evokes strong feelings in me of both sorrow and joy:

Eli Eli, shelo yigameir l'olam: hachol v'hayam, rishrush shel hamayim, b'rak hashamayim, t'filat haadam.

Oh God, my God, I pray that these things never end: The sand and the sea, the rush of the waters, The crash of the heavens, the prayer of humankind.

The poem is a prayer, yet the poet asks for the perpetual survival of purely worldly things, things that please and astonish human beings. Even though the poet knows she will die at some point and never see sand and sea and rushing waters and crashing sky again, she wants all those people who come after her to continue to see them. She wants the world to survive her as it is, in its God-made perfection. To me this poem represents the consecration of the profane, the making holy of our everyday experiences, desires, and prayers. Within its sway, there is no profane and sacred. All is One. Adonai is One. Adonai echad. And she wants the prayers of humankind to go on. She never mentions God's answers, only the prayers we make as human beings, only the prayers that make us human beings. The miracle of this poem is enough to make me want to be Jew.

6) Ultimately the real reason I've made it this far is all of you. When I look at my wife and our family of cats—we have fourteen—I marvel at everything about her and them. And now after you let me into your midst, I likewise marvel at you, that you have allowed me into your company, have made room for me here with you, and have shown me overwhelming grace and loving-kindness. Thus the celebration today is not really about me; it is a celebration of the inclusive community you have created here, a sign of the oneness we have together with Adonai. I know this for certain because you made me part of you. I thank you.




