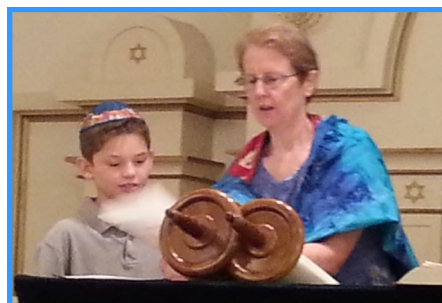

From the Rabbi

“More than the Jewish People has kept Shabbat, Shabbat has kept the Jewish People.” Achad Ha’am

Chanukah is the celebration of religious freedom – so we often say. Historically, the events of that time were as much about internal Jewish struggles as they were about a small army triumphing over superior force. There was a pull toward the modern ideas of Hellenism and a reaction against that.

Change is a constant in the world. Change happens inexorably. Judaism has met change with many different strategies. From the rabbinic creativity that allowed Judaism to arise out of the ashes of the Second Temple’s destruction . . . to Classical Reform Judaism’s ouster of all ritual rules in favor of concentration on the ethical mitzvot . . . to the reaction against that approach, which resulted in the entrenchment of Orthodox Judaism . . . to Conservative Judaism’s finding a space between the two extremes . . . to contemporary Reform reincorporating much more Hebrew and much more ritual.

There are always changes to deal with. One that has come up recently is the idea of having Friday night services at an earlier time. Those of us who thought it was worth a trial period were thinking of it as a purely technical problem. If we make it easier for people to come to service on their way home from work, more people might come. It’s worth a try! There has been a certain amount of resistance to the idea. As I learned in rabbinic school, “Resistance is our friend.” That is because we have a way to find out what people care about.

After consulting an expert in the field of synagogue change, I have realized that changing Friday night service times is a complex issue. It involves larger questions. What are our values around Friday night services? What is our culture around Shabbat? What is it like to be Jewish here in Huntington and how does that play into the possibilities of Shabbat for us?

Let us study our B’nai Sholom culture, remembering that our boundaries are infinitely permeable. (people come and go regularly, ideas flow even more fluidly) What things push us away from the synagogue? (private time, family commitments, work commitments, lack of engagement with Judaism)

What things pull us together?

(Jewish memories, shared values, a place to express our minority culture within the majority, desire for life to be meaningful and finding some of that meaning in Judaism) All of these are happening as we live in a state of constant change.

So, my apologies for mistakenly thinking this was an easy thing to try. Some personalities thrive on change. Others approach it more cautiously. We all have to deal with it, because without adapting to a changing world we will lose relevance and die as a synagogue. The question is: How do we explore the possibilities and have a deep conversation that deals most productively with our options?

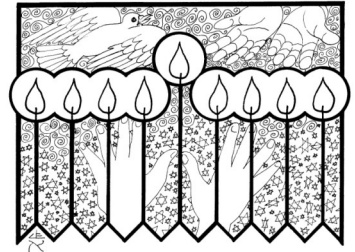
The Sages say Shabbat is a taste of the world to come. So whatever your idea of the best of life is, that is what Shabbat gives you the opportunity to experiment with every week. Shabbat has so much potential. It is a Palace in Time, an opportunity for individual and communal renewal.

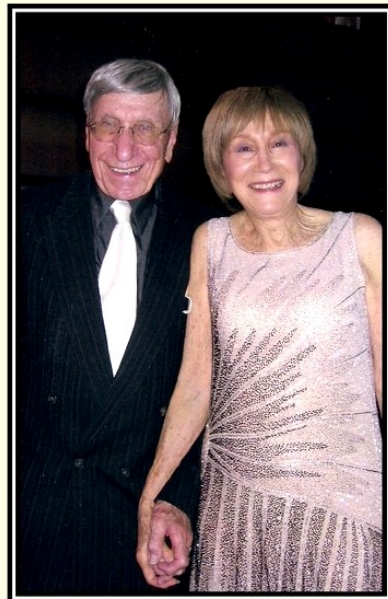

*Mussar is the Jewish discipline of self-improvement. Our Mussar group will meet every other week or so on Shabbat morning. We will study what Jewish texts say about the various characteristics of our personalities that could use honing. In between gatherings participants are invited to watch how the soul trait we are studying works in their own lives.

Session 1, January 17

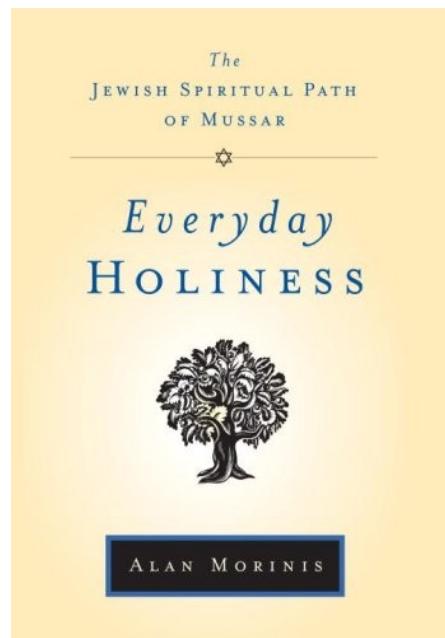
Intro and Humility (I’ve taught about it more than once so it’s one we can go lightly on in class.)

Humility - Occupy a rightful space, neither too much nor too little.

“Rabbi Chatzkel Abramsky, a well-known leader of the Jewish community in England, was once called to testify in court. His lawyer asked him, “Rabbi Abramsky, is it true that you are the greatest living Jewish legal authority in Europe?” The rabbi replied, “Yes, that is true.” At that point the judge interjected and said, “Rabbi Abramsky, is that not rather haughty on your part? I thought that your laws and ethics teach you to be humble.” To which Rabbi Abramsky responded, “I know we are taught to be humble. But what can I do? I am under oath.”

Session 2, January 31

About TRUTH, Alan Morinis writes: “The goal is to live truth according to the guidance of your discerning heart, for the sake of the soul you are as well as the souls of others.” *Everyday Holiness*, p. 172.



CHANNUKAH BLESSINGS – This year we light the first candle on the evening of December 16.

Candles are added to the *Hanukkiyah* from right to left but are kindled from left to right. The newest candle is lit first. (On the Shabbat of Hanukkah, kindle the Hanukkah lights first and then the Shabbat candles.)

Light the *Shamash* - the helper candle - first using it to kindle the rest of the Hanukkah lights; say or sing:

ברוך אתה יי אלהינו מלך העולם אשר קדשנו במצותיו וצונו להדליק
נר של חנוכה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Chanukah.

Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who hallows us with mitzvot, commanding us to kindle the Hanukkah lights.

ברוך אתה יי אלהינו מלך העולם שעשה נסים לאבותינו ואמותינו
בימים ההם בזמן הזה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, she-asah nisim laavoteinu v'imoteinu bayamim hahaeim baz'man hazeh. Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, who performed wondrous deeds for our ancestors in days of old at this season.

For first night only:

ברוך אתה יי אלהינו מלך העולם שהחיינו וקימנו והגיענו לזמן הזה.

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, shehecheyanu v'kiy'manu v'higianu laz'man hazeh. Blessed are You, Adonai our God, Sovereign of all, for giving us life, for sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach this season.
