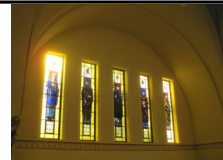

From the Rabbi

"Build a Sanctuary for Me that I may dwell among them." Exodus 24:8

"Rabbi Jeremiah said in the name of Rabbi Abbahu, 'Seek out Adonai' (Isaiah 55:6). And where may God be found? In the synagogues and study houses."

Jerusalem Talmud, Berakhot 5:1

- Three thousand years ago, give or take a few centuries, our ancestors understood God as directing us to build a structure that we might experience God's presence.
- Two thousand years ago, or so, the writers of the Jerusalem Talmud understood God to be found in the place where we gather to pray and study Jewish texts.
- One thousand year ago Rashi cited a midrash that explained that the "house of the people" referred to in Jeremiah 39:8 was the beit kneset, the house of gathering, the synagogue.

In this millennia we are trying to establish new relationships with God, with each other, with Judaism. Institutional Judaism has lost its attraction for younger generations. American Jews today tend to find holiness in nature. We are likely to find meaning in making the world a better place and supporting our families. Many of us don't have a sacred connection with the beit kneset, the institution of B'nai Shalom. The prayer service may not speak to us anymore, the ancient words no longer resonating.

It is up to every generation of Jews to reinterpret, redescribe, reimagine what the ancient texts and rituals mean in our own time and place. Every year at Seder we read Exodus 35:8, "You shall explain to your child on that day, 'It is because of what God did for ME when I went free from Egypt.'" We read our own lives into the ancient stories and make the stories real and true for our own day. Because many generations before us have carried out this task, the stories and the rituals are rich and textured with many levels of meaning and possibility. They have stood the test of time. It is up to us to make them real and immediate again.

We need to restructure our finances (more at the November Congregational Meeting), and we will approach it from an awareness of possibility. As we are restructuring and setting priorities, we have this opportunity to decide what is important to us as a congregation. Not what was important to our parents or grandparents, but what is compelling to us and our children. To wonder what might breathe new life into our time together. To imagine new ways of energizing our traditions. Our whole lives are Jewish, and our Jewish lives are rejuvenated by experiencing Judaism in different venues.

Shall we have a Jews and Brews night every week? We have a new brewer in the congregation we should be celebrating. Do you want to go hiking while we study Torah? Shall we have Shabbat dinners in each other's houses or Shabbat outings to restaurants? Can we pool our time and energy to work effectively on the local drug problem? Let's put our heads together!

In the coming months we will be having many conversations about our priorities and making Judaism real in our lives. Not just making it through our lives still connected to the community, but handing on a rejuvenated and exuberant community to the next generation of Jews in Huntington.

As we infuse our everyday lives with the joys of Judaism, may we bless each other and our town.
