

Friendly Reminder: High Holy Day Service Courtesies

The High Holy Days: Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur are almost upon us this year. We look forward to seeing all of you and your families at the upcoming services to celebrate, pray and connect with friends, family and fellow members of our Jewish community.

We welcome you and want to remind you of the need to be respectful and considerate of others. This applies to both adults and children. Please refrain from excessive talking and other noise or conduct that might be disruptive or otherwise interfere with others' participation in and enjoyment of services.

Please turn off all cell phones and pagers before entering services and limit the number of times you enter and leave the sanctuary during services. When entering or leaving is necessary, please avoid walking in front of the bima.

Whenever possible, enter or exit from the back or side of the sanctuary. Also, please do not enter or exit the Sanctuary while the Ark is open, which is usually the case when you see people standing.

ISRAEL and THE NEW YEAR

"Receive me back, let me return"

Jeremiah 31:18, Haftarah Reading for Second Day Rosh Hashanah

As I write, there is a truce between Israel and Gaza. The agreement is preliminary; there are more negotiations to come. For many of us the past two months has been a time to defend Israel. This can be a very divisive issue even among friends, even in a congregation. The main points:



- Hamas has been firing rockets into Israel for years. The frequency only escalated this summer.
- Israel uses substantial resources to protect its citizens whereas Hamas uses the residents of Gaza as human shields, firing their rockets even next to UN buildings, hospitals and schools. Hamas has been using its resources to acquire munitions and build tunnels to attack Israel.
- Israel has done more than any other army to warn residents of impending attacks, including phone calls, leaflets, and dropping a dummy bomb before the exploding one.

That is only the current situation. We could go back to questioning why Israel absorbed Jews from all over the Arab world and why the Palestinians have been kept in refugee camps in Gaza, the West Bank, Syria, Lebanon, and Jordan. And any number of additional issues. The point is that neither the Jews nor the Palestinians are leaving. What can we do to keep Israel alive and promote peace for everyone?

We American Jews have to keep supporting the Israelis. Some do that by sending resources to "Stop the Sirens," a joint effort of Jewish Federations, and the Conservative and Reform Movements. Go to our website to find the donation information. Some of us visit even during difficult times. That is huge. Even more important is becoming informed (try visiting Israeli papers online) and being able to speak calmly and convincingly to friends and neighbors wondering what is going on.

To that end about 30 of us got together a couple of Sundays ago to talk about the *matzav*, the situation in Israel. Views were expressed that were totally in support of everything Israel had been doing as well as worrying about the death and destruction in Gaza. In the past we have been judgmental of each other labeling those who didn't agree with us. That day we had a conversation about a difficult topic in a civil manner without putting anyone down. That is important. That is what we need to do. Receive them back and let them return. As long as we don't alienate anyone we can work together to heal the world.

Tikkun Olam, repairing the world, is about defending Israel and making life better for people everywhere — including here in Huntington. The FIFTY DAYS between the first of Elul (the day our Torah scribe came to town) and Simchat Torah (October 15) when we dance around with all our Torah scrolls at the end of our High Holy Day Season is our HIGH HOLY DAY FOOD DRIVE for the Facing Hunger Food Bank. See page 4 for preferred items. Just bring a case of food one time and you're done! Money is fine too.

May the coming year be one of plenty and peace, and may we do our part to make it so.

ANNOUNCING BIG CHANGE TO OUR KROGER GIFT CARD PROGRAM!!!!!

Significant changes to the Kroger Gift Card Program have been forced upon us by Kroger's corporate office. **Effective September 1st, 2014,** you will no longer be receiving any Kroger gift cards by mail because Kroger will be changing their existing program from "Kroger Cares" to a new program called "Kroger Community Rewards". What this means to our congregation is that there will be a new, easier and better way to make even more money for our congregation. Three and half million dollars has been designated for this program to assist entities like ours, along with developed organizations and schools within our area.

To participate, first the Temple must register. Then in time we will ask you to register your Kroger Plus Cards into the system. When people start registering their card numbers and then swiping the card at checkout, we will be back on track to making money for our congregation.



"Trip to Israel" program will provide grants of up to \$8,000 per person for Huntington Jewish youth ages high school to 28 years of age on approved trips to Israel. Children and grandchildren of Temple members and Marshall University students are eligible for this grant.

"Jewish Camp" program will provide grants of up to \$4,000 per student for Jewish Religious School students to attend Jewish Camp. Family Jewish Camps are also eligible for this grant.

"Taglit Birthright" offers free trips to Israel for Jews 18 to 26 years. We can assist you with the application and being given priority preference to be accepted on the trips.



Many Thanks to Herb and Betty **Colker For Funding the Restoration of Our Torahs!**


When I first arrived at B'nai Sholom Herb Colker wanted me to arrange for a scribe to come care for our Sifrei Torah - our scrolls.
